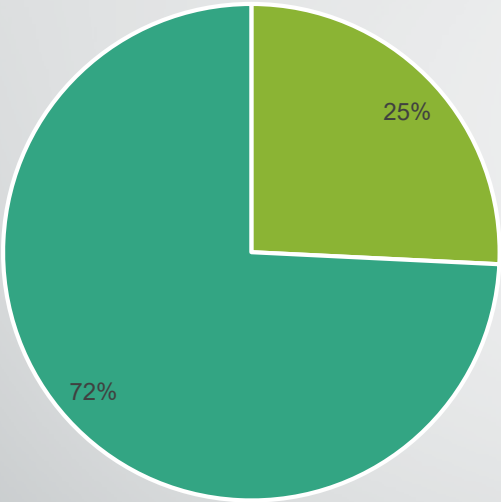

67%: First-Generation / 59% CCPG recipients

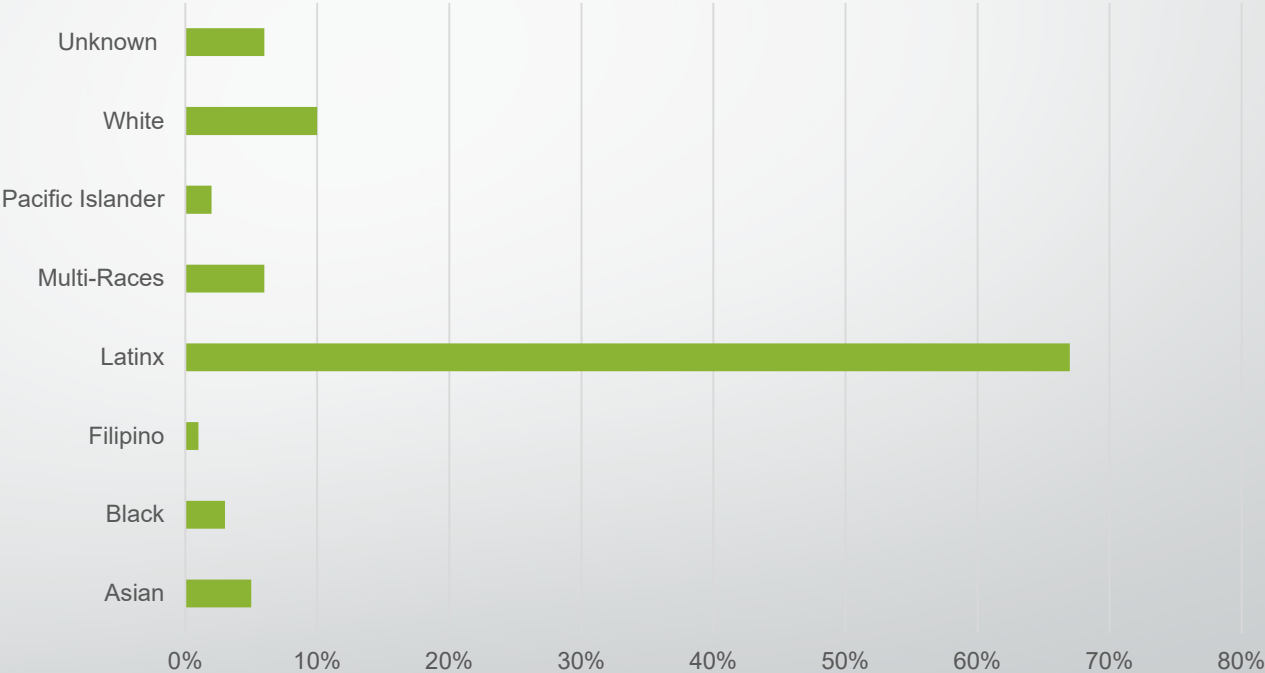
Gender

Race/Ethnicity

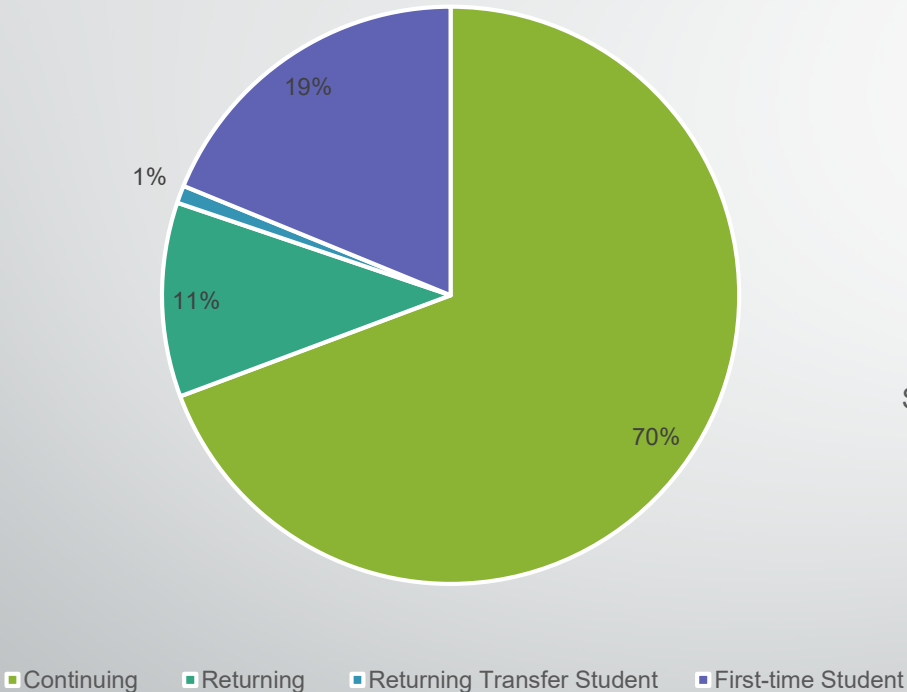

# Students: By the Numbers

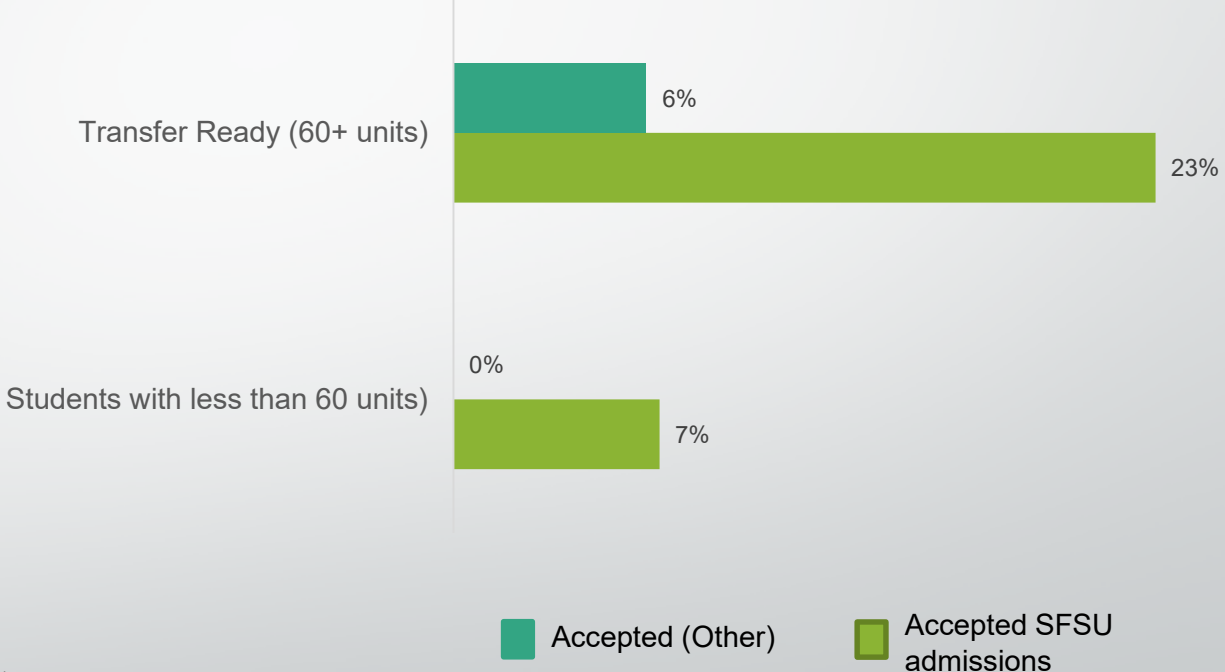
Total number students served: 275

# Program Feedback Snapshot

- Mentee and mentor highlights: mentoring helped address academic challenges, all felt connected to the program virtually, and all felt a sense of belonging in the ¡ESO! Adelante programs.
- The services provided by ¡ESO! Adelante were accessible and well-communicated.
- Map Your Pathway to SF State highlight: Students gained new information and that the event was informative. They also felt that the event prepared them to transfer out of Cañada and that they would recommend others to attend.
