Focus Topic: OER and Remote Learning



Now that we all are moving to fully remote learning for the next few months, and social justice and equity being a high priority at most community colleges, more educators are thinking about being using open educational resources for their courses. As we know, OER offer some great perks: they are free to use and are open access; they are digital, which means they can be integrated into a learning management system (like Canvas) easily, and there has been a surge of high-quality (and even peer-reviewed!) textbooks and course materials in the last 5 years. And now that we're all fully online, many of us are looking for more resources--elements that normally our students would access via the library or learning center, or perhaps from class colleagues and professors who pass along information.

With that in mind, check out what has come across the OER list-servs. There are some real gems with respect to connecting resources, using OER for remote learning--and more importantly, include activities and assessments that are Ideas:

- ISKME, the non-profit foundation behind OER Commons is expanding their reach, sending newsletters and creating conversation spaces to discuss the intersection of education, outreach, and equity. Their homepage (<https://iskme.org/>) has more information, and their YT video (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=llHT9Zkhmho>) gives a brief glimpse on their mission.
- Compilation of 'Amazing Educational Resources' that are open/free to use (<https://www.amazingeducationalresources.com/>)--and this has expanded greatly over the summer and fall.
- Resources for everyone--students, faculty--with respect to digital well-being and online learning: <https://library.mccnh.edu/well-being>--Because we all have to be mindful of the stressors in our lives, as well as those in the lives of our students.

Other OER News

- Our English colleagues at the College of the Sequoias have a new podcast! The Writability Podcast (<https://libguides.cos.edu/writabilitypodcast>) is mostly directed at students to improve their engagement in class, improve using the tools that they have at their disposal, and so much more.
- OpenStax has officially surpassed \$1 billion in student savings--that is unreal! This speaks to the power of OER, and why these resources are crucial if we are to expand our equity-mindedness practices throughout our campus.
- What our colleagues at Citrus College are using for OER: <https://libguides.citruscollege.edu/oer/no-cost-titles>--there are some outstanding titles here, including CTE and Transfer courses.
- Texas' OERTex (<https://oertx.highered.texas.gov/>)--another new repository, full of options that are being used at all of the colleges throughout Texas--including the community colleges. (Austin Community College has been a big supporter of OER.)
- Reedley College's ESL's YouTube channel--student-focused tutorial videos on a variety of language and mechanics lessons.

From Taskforce to Subcommittee

All in the name of equity

You may be asking yourself: Why the change? What's the difference between a 'task force' and a 'subcommittee'? Glad you asked!

By the definitions that the Planning and Budgeting Council came up with in May 2020, a 'task force' meets only for a year to work on a very specific problem or query. Anything that meets for longer and/or has a broader scope should be a committee (or subcommittee). For that reason the request was asked of the Academic Senate General Council (since this group was already under them) to turn this body from a 'task force' into a 'subcommittee'--and it was approved in September 2020.

During the 2020-2021 academic year, the body will work on settling group membership, by-laws, and other pieces that are required by an official subcommittee. Our focus always has, and will continue to be, making course materials accessible to all--meaning that equity will always be at the forefront of our mission. And this is not a one-time subject; this work that is on-going, and should be at the fabric of what we do as a college. So join us!

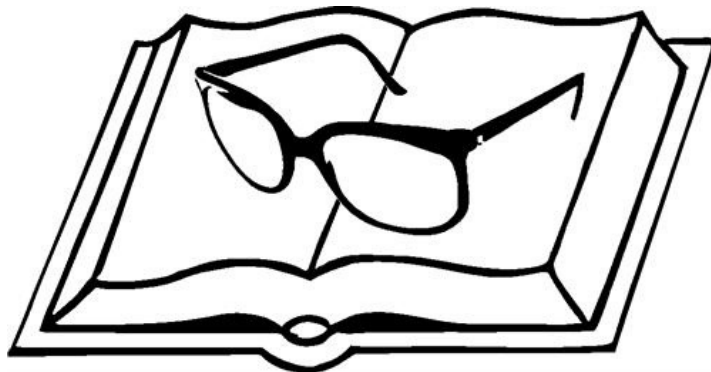

Collaboration in Online Learning and OER

 - Computations and Modeling: sites and apps like OCTAVE and LTSpice
